

Dear friends,

Happy Easter! **Easter, as a noun,** is a state of being: a state of being hopeful; a state of being open to all possibilities as viable; a state of starting over, clean slate, new beginnings; a state of heightened anticipation, of a chance meeting with Jesus himself (like the two on the road to Emmaus; like the Apostle Paul, on the road to Damascus).

Easter, as a verb, has been suggested by Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann. Easter, as a verb, means that God is constantly Eastering things as good as dead. Easter, as a verb, means that God is Eastering the good earth as it teeters towards global warming, and asks us to join our mayor in taking measures to reduce our consumption of water and energy. Easter, as a verb, means that God is Eastering our national and state political processes, raising up leaders who will protect and not discriminate against the fragile, and speak nobly for the common good, and asks that we protest, nudge, push and advocate to that end. Easter, as a verb, means that God is Eastering our church, sprouting a new crop of deacons, elders, and a new pastor, after a long interim season of waiting. Easter, as a verb, means participating in the Eastering activity of God to renew, restore and resurrect this old world. Eastering means that "weeping may last for the night, but joy comes in the morning" (Psalm 30:5). Happy Easter!
