

FROM THE

ASSOCIATE PASTOR

E' n la sua volontade è nostra pace.

Dear Friends:

This past semester I was reintroduced to Dante's **Divine Comedy** through our office Intern at Duke, **Ezgi Ustundag**, who took a course on this classic Italian allegory of journey. In our discussions, I remember only a few verses, but one is the well-known words from *Paradiso (Canto III)*: "In his will is our peace." With the deaths of **Malcolm, Walter, Wendy, Martha, and Howard**, we grieve and wonder about God's will. The tenor of life today keeps pressing in on us. Everything is hurried and rushed. Schedules are tight, even for a Saturday evening dinner with friends. Many of our institutions we rely on to handle our money, health, education, justice, and even religion seem not as reliable as we would like. And then we hear: "In his will is our peace." This is what we want and need.

What Dante has expressed as fact we can grasp as a promise (John 6:39-40). If in some way we can attach ourselves to God's will and allow ourselves to be carried by it, we can hope for peace. We can expect peace, but this question of God's will and our peace is no simple matter when so much of life—supposedly under God's will—leaves us so unsettled. Is it really God's will that awful things happen? How do our struggles fit into God's plan for us?

The Word of God invites us to pray **not** "that I may know thy will," but simply "thy will be done." We are called not to knowing that will but doing that will, letting it happen within us. This is far more demanding since it will require pure trust. When we pray this way, we allow ourselves to be led in ways that we do not know or have chosen. When we pray this way, we acknowledge our trust in the God who does want us to be healed and saved. We are confident that God's will is a loving and saving will and will never let us be lost. That trust in God and God's will cuts through the hard edges, confusions, and heartaches of the very rocky road of life. And then we can know the meaning of the words, "In his will is our peace."

SCHOOL FOR CONVERSION (SFC) SUMMER CLASS

Faith, Families, and Incarceration

This five-week course will explore the connections between our faith, the historical landscape of prisons and its connection with race in the US, the impact the system has on families, and practical responses that faith communities can embrace. Two class sessions will take place inside of a prison, where we will have a book discussion with incarcerated students. The other sessions will meet at the SFC office and include discussion, reflection, and opportunities to hear from guest experts. The class meets on **Mondays from 1:00-2:30** from **June 27 to August 1** (not meeting on July 4), and on July 11 and 18, we will meet inside the prison, and class time will last from 1:00-3:00 p.m. The **cost for the course is \$65 per person**, which includes program expenses as well as the cost of a book for you and for one incarcerated student. Limited scholarships are available. Due to regulations about visiting the prison, please register ASAP if you are interested. Space is limited! Registration dates are: **Monday, June 13**—registration date to enter prison on July 11 and 18; and **Monday, June 20**—registration date to enter prison on July 18 only.
