

DRIVERS NEEDED FOR MIGRANT WORKERS

FLOC (Farm Labor Organizing Committee) needs help transporting FLOC farmworker members from their labor camps to the July 31, 2016 regional meeting in Dudley, NC, at FLOC's office If you CAN drive, please email the following persons: daustin@mindspring.com, salan@nfwm.org AND flocnc@floc.com. Volunteers will drive to workers' camps (with specific directions provided by FLOC) to pick up specific workers, transport workers to the meeting in Dudley, listen in on the meeting, and then transport workers back to their labor camp. The July 31 meeting in Dudley will likely start at 3:00 pm (so that means picking up a small group of workers at an assigned labor camp 30-90 minutes before 3:00, depending on the camp location, which likely means leaving the Triangle somewhere between 11:00 and 12:00. The Dudley meeting will include a modest meal for the workers (and you're welcome to participate), before driving the workers back to their labor camp, starting back at around 5:15. Knowing Spanish is very helpful.
