LECTIONARY CLASS



Dear Friends,

Perhaps we should sing Auld Lang Syne this Sunday, for old time's sake, as we end our liturgical year with proclamations of Christ as King. It's a Sunday that gathers up all the hopes, dreams, disappointments, experiences and relationships of the past year, and tops them off with the affirmation that at the end, as at the beginning of the year, from omega to alpha, Christ's love reigns transcendent over all. Christ the King Sunday leans into Advent, when we wait for the second coming of the One, the King of Love, who will bring his kingdom into fullness, on earth as in heaven. Never should we underestimate the hymns that we have sung over and over, or the prayers that we have prayed over and over, or the meals that we have shared at the Lord's Table, until kingdom comes. The power of these rituals keeps believers strong through many ordeals.

These things run deep, and their power should never be underestimated. I look forward to stepping into these high holy days with you.
