STEWARDSHIP SEASON

Our neighbors at Iglesia Emanuel hold an annual Christmas Pageant that is not to be missed. Music, lights, and children dressed as sheep, shepherds and angels fill the stage. Parents, siblings, and neighbors pack the pews. The evening reflects the broader community to which our church is tied, as well as the many facets of Iglesia Emanuel's ministry. The pageant is purposefully on Wednesday night, the night of Iglesia Emanuel's weekly Food Pantry. Volunteers at Iglesia Emanuel distribute food to anyone who comes. Then, together they share a hot meal. The night of the pageant is no different, with one addition - happy shrieks of children who all receive gifts that evening.

First Presbyterian supports Iglesia Emanuel through our annual budget, allowing Iglesia Emanuel to serve as an anchor along North Roxboro Road, and provide spiritual and physical nourishment to its congregation and others. While it primarily serves the Latino community, its reach is far broader. As a church community, we've engaged in shared learning about immigration and about PCUSA's ministry, Café Justo, which facilitates community-owned economic development in Mexico. Iglesia Emanuel's youth bands perform at Presbytery events, locally and this year, as far away as Kansas.

Iglesia Emanuel is growing. Sunday worship attendance is increasing, as is its programmatic offerings (music lessons, computer classes, a weekly radio show, and soccer camps). As the ministry increases so does our opportunity for giving, through the rising numbers at its weekly Food Pantry and its needs for critical basic infrastructure—like repairing the heating system in the aging church building.

First Presbyterian's growing support of Iglesia Emanuel through our annual giving is tremendously appreciated. And, we look forward to seeing you at the Pageant!

Dear Friends,

"I was moved to tears when you were reading the names of those who died on Sunday." This remark by a member of our congregation struck a chord with me. I was also moved, not only as the names were read, but also as I watched you come forward with your offering for hunger and to be fed at the table of our Lord. I joined others of you in the memorial garden to remember those whose names are recorded on plaques there.
