FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

As we stand on the edge of our Christmas celebrations, we remember Jesus who comes to us as the Prince of Peace. The letter to the Ephesians captures this theme so well: "...now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; ...he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near for through him both of us have access in the one Spirit to the Father." (Ephesians 2: 13, 14, 17). The kind of peace that Jesus, The Prince of Peace, offers is nothing that we can earn, deserve, or merit. It is pure gift. And our recognition of the gift is a humble act of gratitude. This Sunday we praise and thank God in song and scripture who has come among us as the Prince of Peace. Although we recognize that peace is a gift, we are called upon in the beatitudes (Matthew 5:9) to be peacemakers. Peace is God's gift but also our responsibility.

Christmas time invites us to take up our calling to be peacemakers and so to follow in the

footsteps of the Prince of Peace. We do not have to travel far to be good peacemakers. Right here, right now are the possibilities open for us to be makers of peace in our church and community. It begins with our prayer for peace each Sunday at worship; it remembers people who suffer from lack of peace in war-torn parts of the world—Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria, Palestine and Israel; it recalls are neighbors in East Durham who live with the threat of gang violence. It does not forget the families that are divided among themselves. It will not ignore the harm we inflict on each other with our prejudices and fears of difference.

Each of us, each in our own way, can make peace. We can extend ourselves in the family and community or workplace to help build bridges. We can try to resolve differences with those who have hurt us or those whom we have hurt. As citizens after a bitter and divisive election we can encourage our legislators and government leaders to direct our nation in the way of peace. As believers we can give witness to God's gift of peace by what we say and how we act.

Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests! (Luke 2: 14)

- Heard a report from the Personnel committee about raising the hourly pay for the childcare staff. The new rate brings the pay in line with current liveable wage pay for Durham.
- Approved an updated wedding policy. The new policy is available upon request.

The Session and church staff also thanked *Sarah Finbow* and the youth group for the Youth Sunday Worship service, which was thoughtfully planned and deeply moving; and expressed condolences to the NCCU community upon the death of former Chancellor Debra Saunders-White.
