

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends,

Sometimes, when we encounter someone who is different, we turn away, find something else to do or someone else to talk with and avoid having to deal with the difference at all. We know that it will likely be uncomfortable or difficult if we try to overcome our differences, so sometimes we find it easier not to try at all.

Sometimes, when we encounter someone who is different, we invite them to come over to us, to join us where we are, to be like us. We hope that we can erase the difference by saying, "Come join me! Come be like me!"

A third option exists in which we cross the road to the other. We go to where people who are different live and move and have their being. We listen, we pay attention, we empathize, and we join our neighbors in their own space without expecting them to become like us. This can be difficult. But it may also be the best way to understand and love our neighbor. Henri Nouwen once wrote,

We become neighbours when we are willing to cross the road for one another. There is so much separation and segregation: between black people and white people, between gay people and straight people, between young people and old people, between sick people and healthy people, between prisoners and free people, between Jews and Gentiles, Muslims and Christians, Protestants and Catholics, Greek Catholics and Latin Catholics.

There is a lot of road crossing to do. We are all very busy in our own circles. We have our own people to go to and our own affairs to take care of. But if we could cross the street once in a while and pay attention to what is happening on the other side, we might become neighbours.

One small way we can do this "crossing over" on Sunday morning is to move outside our comfort zone and our favorite pew to join another who might be sitting alone. Visitors come in and often are unintentionally isolated. We can join them in their space – come to them rather than expecting them to come to us. This is a way to welcome new neighbors in to the space we refer to as God's house. This is but one small way we can cross over to join our neighbor. I pray you will find other ways to do this in your life and work this week!


