From the Pastor

Dear friends,

Our friends have been barred from entering our country. Some of our neighbors in the U.S. are fearful to leave, lest they not be able to return. Many refugees in our midst in Durham long to be reunited with family members. We Christians have something to say about this. We have something to do about this.

Many, many years ago, God's people the Israelites were strangers in the foreign land of Egypt. That experience helped them to have empathy with others who were strangers in a foreign land. Deuteronomy 10:19 says, "You shall love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." On Friday, at a rally in Durham to support refugees and immigrants, Rabbi Larry Bach of the Judea Reform congregation, reminded those present of this:

We do this because of our faith. To be a Jew is to be someone who sees his roots in slavery and deprivation. "We were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt," we recite each year at our Passover meals. To be a Jew is to be someone who sees her freedom from slavery not as a license to forget, but as a compelling call to remember. "Love the stranger, for you know the heart of the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." To be a Jew is to be part of a People who acutely feel a responsibility to repair the world, to shed light in dark places, to bring Redemption just a bit closer each day, through each deed. Caring for refugees is not optional for us. Our faith compels us.

In the same way, our faith compels Christians to care for refugees. In Matthew 25:35c, Jesus reminds us to care for one another as if the other is Jesus, "for I was a stranger and you welcomed me." In his letter to the Romans, Paul exhorts us to "Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers" (Romans 12:13). In Hebrews we are instructed: "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:2). We are called to love our neighbor and Jesus teaches in Luke that our neighbor is anyone in need. Our Muslim sisters and brothers are in need right now. May we hold them in prayer and work to advocate for their welcome to our country, to our city, and as our friends.

After graduating from Glenbarn High School and Eastern Illinois University, Sarah taught school. While working in a government job during World War II, she met her husband. The family moved to Durham in the early 1950s where their sons attended George Watts Elementary School and graduated from Durham High School. As an active member of First Presbyterian Church, she taught Sunday School, played the piano, and served in many roles in Presbyterian Women. Even though Sarah cannot attend worship now, she remains interested in the life and



activities of the church. She moved to Croasdaile Village Retirement Community in 1999, where she organized a "Presbyterian table" in the dining room. Family portraits and other pictures she painted over the years are displayed on her apartment walls.

FPC Session Briefs

Stated Meeting, January 23, 2017

The Session met in its first stated meeting of the year on January 23, 2017. Elders were glad to be back together after a 2-month break, and the meeting was full of lively and productive discussion. During the meeting, the Session:

- Received a report from the Stewardship Committee, and discussed using additional statistical methods to better understand giving patterns.
- Approved the creation of an ad hoc committee named by Finance and Investment to study the budgeting process and make recommendations. The ad hoc committee will include members from the Personnel, Property, and Service and Mission committees.
- Heard a report from the Assessment Team, which was appointed by the Session to review the transition between pastors. Homer Ashby, Caroline Pritchett, and Kate Busa represented the team at the Session meeting. The team drafted a letter which summarized our experience and made recommendations to the Presbytery. It is hoped that the Presbytery will use these suggestions to better help other congregations going through this same process. The Session voted to send the letter to the Presbytery of New Hope's Executive Presbyter Ted Churn and the Commission on Ministry. Hard copies of the letter are available on the table in the foyer, and an electronic copy is available from Valerie McMillian or Lyn Francisco.
