From the Pastor

Dear friends,

In our nation over the last weeks and months, we have heard a lot of conversation (and a lot of accusation) about truth-telling or the lack thereof. People from opposing sides of issues and political stances point fingers at one another accusing the other of lying ("misrepresenting the truth" is too tame a phrase to use these days). What once seemed to many of us to be obvious, indisputable facts are now called into question and we find ourselves shaking our heads in disbelief. "What is truth?" we ask in an echo of Pontius Pilate who asked the same of Jesus in John 18:37 when Jesus told him he came to witness the truth and that those who listen to the side of the truth listen to him. No one knows exactly what Pilate meant by this, but we can guess that he might have meant that he was hearing many different versions of "truth." After hearing Jesus' claim, however, he declared that he could find no basis to charge him. It seems he had heard, and found, the truth.

In John 1:14, the gospel writer connects Jesus directly with truth: "[T]he Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." Grace and truth. It seems to me like we need a little more of both of these things these days.

I leave you with a poem from Carl Sandberg, *My Name Is Truth*:

My head knocks against the stars.
My feet are on the hilltops.
My finger-tips are in the valleys and shores of universal life.
Down in the sounding foam of primal things
I reach my hands and play with pebbles of destiny.
I have been to hell and back many times.
I know all about heaven, for I have talked with God.
I dabble in the blood and guts of the terrible.
I know the passionate seizure of beauty
And the marvelous rebellion of man at all signs reading "Keep Off."
My name is Truth and I am the most elusive captive in the universe.
Who Am I?

May we know truth when we see it, friends. May we help each other stay the course and keep our eyes focused on Jesus, our grace and our truth.

YOKEFELLOW MINISTRY



During the recent Listening Sessions members of the congregation expressed an interest in prison ministry. On **Monday, March 6 at 7:00 pm**, Rev. David Morton will provide education and training for Yokefellow Ministry at First Presbyterian Church. Yokefellow Prison Ministry of North Carolina is an inter-denominational Christian ministry of reconciliation begun in 1969. Its focus is on a ministry of listening, encouragement, and support from volunteers to those in prison in the form of small group meetings. This session will last one and a half hours.

After the informational session on Monday, those interested in volunteering as a Yokefellow at Orange County Correctional, a minimum prison facility near Hillsborough, will complete paperwork and training at the Peace Center at OCC on **Thursday, March 9 at 6:00 pm**. This training is lead by Chaplain Jerry Love. The training is required to volunteer at the prison.

If you think that you might have an interest in this new ministry, please come to the Yokefellow session to learn more about this approach. Attendance does not commit you to become a volunteer.
