

We are honored to have the *Triangle Jewish Chorale* share their talents with us in worship today. Since 1994 the Triangle Jewish Chorale has performed traditional and modern music that expresses the faith and culture of the Jewish people. Concerts consist of songs in English, Hebrew, Yiddish, Ladino, and other languages of regions where Jews have lived. Their repertoire includes a variety of styles, from folk tunes to opera choruses, from liturgical cants to Yiddish theater songs. The Chorale presents two formal concerts each year and also sings at memorials, dedications, festivals, and other special events. Lorena Guillen is the Music Director and J. Samuel Hammond is the accompanist.

First Presbyterian Church welcomes all who worship here. We honor and celebrate the human diversity and unity that God gives us in Christ. THE HUNGER FOR CHANGE OFFERING

Hunger has become more prevalent, particularly since the recession. First Presbyterian Church of Durham has a long history of involvement in hunger-related mission, most notably Pennies for Hunger (now Hunger for Change) and the Durham CROP Walk. In addition, we coordinate volunteers for the Community Kitchen at Urban Ministries of Durham, collect food for the members at Iglesia Emanuel Presbyterian Fellowship, and the Food Bank of Central and Eastern NC. Our youth sponsor the annual Souper Bowl of Caring to raise money for hunger-related missions. We also encourage giving to the One Great Hour of Sharing Hunger Offering on Easter Sunday which funds mission activities related to disaster assistance and hunger programs locally and around the world. The funds received from our Hunger for Change Offering go to the New Hope Presbytery for the Presbyterian Hunger Relief Program and are dispersed through local grants to hunger relief programs based on a grant application process. The fourth Sunday of each month is designated to receive the Hunger for Change Offering. Please consider supporting this hunger relief effort with a generous offering next Sunday.


