First Presbyterian Church welcomes all who worship here. We honor and celebrate the human diversity and unity that God gives us in Christ. We welcome individuals of every age, race, nationality, gender, ability, sexual orientation, and economic circumstance to participate fully in the life of the church. So that we may better know each other, please sign the Ritual of Friendship pad, pass it along the center pew across to the shorter side pew, and then return it to the starting point, noting the names of those sitting near you. On March 1, we welcomed 11 visitors to worship.

The *flowers* in the sanctuary today are given to the glory of God and in loving memory of *Bill Lorimer* on the occasion of his March 7 birthday by *Marcia*, *Stephen*, *and David Lorimer*.

Nursery care for infants to 6 years of age is provided during worship on the second floor of the Education Building. Following "A Time with Children," children can remain in worship with their parents, guardians, and siblings, or return to nursery care. There is a changing table in the narthex, to the left as you exit the rear of the sanctuary.

Worship bags and activity bulletins are available in the foyer for children. Books are on the pews in the narthex for young children to read and enjoy should they need a break from the service.

The *Pulpit Paraments*: In 2012 First Presbyterian Church commissioned Laurie Wohl to design and create paraments to be hung from the pulpit and lectern during Lent and Advent. Wohl is an internationally known fiber artist who exhibited her work at the church in spring of 2012. Her liturgical projects emphasize the "threads that bind" and the unity of the Old and New Testaments. We are grateful that the bequest of Anne 'St. Clair' Williams made it possible to enhance our sanctuary with these beautiful works of art.

The *Lenten Banner* was completed in 1990 and dedicated in 1991. It depicts traditional Lenten symbols. The banner was made possible by funds donated in memory of *Bess Bryant* and by the stitching of many devoted members of this congregation.

Portions of today's worship texts were reprinted from Book of Common Worship (2018) and Feasting on the Word.

The bulletin cover, "Choices," is artwork by American artist, Steven Langston.

Lenten Book Study begins this week . . .





Dear FPC Family and Friends,

As the Coronavirus (COVID-19) has moved into the United States, and Wake County, and as we hear more and more warnings about the increasing probability of a potential widespread outbreak in the United States - I want to address the ways this affects our community. While I believe that Christians should not be ruled by fear, I also understand that, we need to be good stewards and should not promote unnecessary risks. The Coronavirus has a long incubation period, which makes it hard to detect and contain early, and

the virus is particularly dangerous to immune-compromised populations including children and older adults. Therefore, I share a couple of reminders and ideas:

- 1. Discernment: Only you can decide what is the right course of action for you. If you are prone to illness protect yourself. Sermons are posted on our website: www.firstpres-Durham.org and are available on podcast platforms.
- 2. Prevention: the best things we can do regularly to avoid cold and flu are also true for COVID-19:
 - Wash your hands with soap and water frequently. Soap breaks down the protective layer of the virus and kills it.
 - Disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
 - Cough or sneeze into your elbow (not your hands).
 - If you are sick . . . stay home.
- 3. The Church:
 - We will still gather for worship; we will still pass the peace—feel free to use the peace sign 🧳 , praver



symbol [1], or abstain. If an outbreak does occur, we will follow any quarantine practices and we will corporately abstain from physically passing the peace, but until then, we will continue as normal.

- We will still celebrate communion, but that doesn't mean you have to you may always choose not to partake in communion. Feel free to come forward to seek a blessing (the next communion is not scheduled until April).
- We will review safety and cleaning practices and increase disinfecting food surfaces and areas where many people congregate.
- We will have hand-sanitizer at key entry-points in the church. However, hand-sanitizers are not a replacement for good hand washing: remember to wet hands before washing, scrub both sides with soap for 20 seconds, and then rinse.

A task force is being established this week to guide us in the days and weeks ahead. Please let me know if you would like to serve on this team.

If you do become ill, please let us know and allow us to be the church to you by dropping off needed supplies and nourishment at your doorstep. I certainly appreciate everyone's concern for the well-being of all our members and neighbors.

The key is preparedness over panic and the church leadership will continue to keep its ear to recommended practices for prevention. If you have any further questions do not hesitate to contact me.

WELCOMING OUR NEIGHBORS AND FRIENDS




On Sunday mornings First Presbyterian Church (FPC) gives thanks for those God brings our way and wants to welcome all people with warmth and hospitality, regardless of their life circumstance. Occasionally, a visitor may ask for money or food. Members and friends want to help, but may not know what the right response should be. In order to help our members and friends receive our visitors with grace and love, while also recognizing certain restrictions and boundaries we have on Sundays, we recently compiled the following information for those times when a visitor asks for assistance:

- a. **Food, immediately**: Free, hot lunch is available on Saturdays and Sundays from 12:30-1:30 at *Urban Ministries of Durham. Blessing bags (i.e. snack bags) from FPC are available only during the week.
- b. **Food, long term:** *Urban Ministries of Durham food pantry is open 9-11 a.m., Monday-Thursday. They provide three meals a day, every day. No one should be hungry in Durham.
- c. Clothing: Urban Ministries of Durham clothes closet is open 9-11 a.m. Monday-Thursday.
- d. **Bus passes:** Along with other forms of assistance, bus passes can be requested at FPC on Mondays and Thursdays between 9 a.m. and noon at our Walk-in Ministry. We do not offer this assistance on Sundays.
- e. Requests for money: For many reasons, please do not give out cash. FPC does not give cash.
- f. **Request to meet with pastor**: Pastoral appointments can be made through our Monday and Thursday Walk- in Ministry volunteers.
- g. **Needing prayer or prayerful listening:** We are working on putting together a prayer team that will be available following worship for those who need prayer or someone to just talk to for a bit. Stay tuned for more information!

The FPC Walk-in Ministry offers prayer, support, guidance and assistance in many forms on Monday and Thursday mornings from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. When in doubt about how to offer assistance, please direct individuals to this important ministry of the church.

Most of all, we want to always treat our visitors with dignity and respect, showing kindness and compassion and giving a listening ear. If at any time, however, someone becomes agitated or angry, please ask them to leave or find someone else who can ask them to leave.

*Urban Ministries of Durham is located on 410 Liberty Street, behind St. Philip's Episcopal Church, one block from the FPC parking lot. Mon-Fri – breakfast and lunch bag 8-9 a.m., dinner 7-8 p.m.; Sat-Sun – breakfast 9:30-10:30 a.m., lunch 12:30-1:30 p.m., dinner 7-8 p.m. Note: Your stewardship dollars provide financial support to Urban Ministries through our Service and Mission budget.
