





From the Contemplative Collective of FPC:

Dear saints of FPC, most of us are familiar with the lighting of the Advent wreath in December, to mark the weeks that are passing as we journey to the holy night when Christ was born. Week by week, we light candles which symbolize hope, peace, joy and love. The increasing gleam of light that illuminates from the candles speaks of the promise that a people traveling in great darkness will see a great light.

In this season, the Contemplative Collective of FPC is bringing you a new Lenten practice that takes inspiration from the Advent wreath. Instead of lighting a candle weekly, however, our Lenten “wreath” extinguishes a candle weekly as we approach the most solemn day of the Christian year. The dimming of light on the Sundays in Lent reminds us that we are all, individually and collectively, on a 40-day journey together, walking toward the cross of Good Friday. On Easter Sunday, the candles will be relit, to remind us of how Christ is victorious over death and that the light of Christ is forever gleaming in the stories of our lives.

Each week, we encourage you to look in the bulletin for a description of that week’s particular theme and the corresponding decor of the wreath. We will also pose an invitational question for you to contemplate in your week’s journey. It is our hope that this new practice in worship for this liturgical season will remind us of the intentional nature of the Lenten season, and will open our hearts to hearing God’s voice in new, distinct ways.

THE HUNGER FOR CHANGE OFFERING

First Presbyterian Church of Durham has a long history of involvement in hunger-related mission, most notably Pennies for Hunger (now Hunger for Change) and the Durham CROP Walk. In addition, we coordinate volunteers for the Community Café at Urban Ministries of Durham, collect and bag food for the Iglesia Emanuel's Food Pantry, and the Food Bank of Central and Eastern NC. We also encourage giving to the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering on Easter Sunday which funds mission activities related to disaster assistance and hunger programs locally and around the world.

The funds received from our Hunger for Change Offering go to the New Hope Presbytery for the Presbyterian Hunger Relief Program and are divided as follows:

50% - International Hunger Relief Programs

40% - Local Hunger Programs

10% - Administration.

These funds are dispersed through local grants to hunger relief programs based on a grant application process. Urban Ministries of Durham and Iglesia Emanuel's Food Pantry have been frequent recipients. FPC has also received funds to purchase supplies for blessing bags.

If your family committed to saving a **penny**/day each month, you'd be donating about \$0.30 per month or \$3.65 for the entire year. That's not much in the face of the rising need. Save a **nickel**/day, and you can contribute \$1.50 per month. A **dime**/day will generate \$3.00, and a **quarter**/a day will generate \$7.50 per month.

The fourth Sunday of each month is designated to receive the Hunger for Change Offering. Please consider supporting this hunger relief effort with a generous offering each month.
