Ash Wednesday - February 18

Please join us on Wednesday as we begin our Lenten journey of preparation for Easter with an Ash Wednesday Service at 12:30 p.m., and again at 6:00 p.m. with Holy Communion. The **mid-day service** will be celebrated at FPC with our friends and neighbors from Trinity United Methodist. Both services will feature the imposition of ashes, as each of us will be marked with the sign of the cross: a sign of both our sinfulness and our redemption in Christ. **The evening meal is being cancelled due to travel conditions.**

LENTEN STUDIES

FAITH AND COMMUNITY CLASS

Beginning Sunday, March 1, the Faith and Community will take a close look at some of the greater themes and spiritual practices associated with Lent: sin, conversion, baptism, sacrifice, redemption, dying and rising with Christ – and how these impact our daily living. **Homer Ashby, Sam Miglarese, and Jon Nelson** will lead the discussions.

BOOK STUDY FOR LENT

The Book of Forgiving, by Desmond Tutu and his daughter Mpho Tutu, is described by Deepak Chopra as "a primer for not only finding the path for healing ourselves and the world, but for restoring balance in our biology, mind, and spirit." If you want a process for practicing forgiveness for someone else, but also for yourself, you might find Tutu's approach both practical and appealing. The **Friday class** meets at the church from 10:30 – noon and runs from February 20 – March 27; the **Sunday class** meets at Croasdaile Village in the Heritage Hall activity room from 3:00 – 4:30, and runs from February 22 – March 29. Dr. Cole-Turner completes his seminar with church professionals and interested lay people on Monday morning at 11 a.m. in Watts-Hill Hall.
