**Pastoral care is a vital foundation
of our church.**

I once thought pastoral care was limited to ministers visiting the homebound and caring for ill members. When **Will** and I had two sick children over a short time period, we experienced the pastoral care provided by the wider congregation of caregivers.

Our first gift of pastoral care came to us in December 2003. I was pregnant with high-risk twins. Only one twin survived and was born at 29 weeks. You know her as **Laura Mishler**. Laura Mish spent 10 weeks in the NICU while Will and I worked saving leave until she could be home.

First Pres members surrounded us with prayers, meals, dog walking, leaf raking, and other amazing acts that were invaluable in such a stressful time. This kindness came from members we didn't know well at a time when we were still new to the church. What a gift of pastoral care!

Our second gift of pastoral care came a few years later after Will and I had our second daughter **Florence**. Florence became sick at age two with a difficult to diagnose disease. Will and I traveled with Florence across the country seeking medical advice.

The stress of medical travel and living at different hospitals for months is indescribable. But yet First Pres was active on our home-front: delivering meals, retrieving groceries, hosting Laura Mish play-dates, reading to Florence, singing Christmas carols, raking bags of leaves, and showering us with prayers. Each of these generous acts gave us courage to continue on the journey knowing that God is good.

When the community of church members, along with the ministers, together takes part in the care-giving, this is pastoral care at its best! And this is an essential part of our foundation.

Okay, I admit it. I bought a Christmas present last week, before Halloween and lo-o-o-ong before Thanksgiving. Prepare an intervention for me, please.

My mother would hit the sales racks on the days between Christmas and New Years Day to pick up treasures for NEXT year's Christmas. Often those presents would sit in their festive wrappings for 360 days before the recipients could open them. She kept them in a closet and throughout the year had to dust them to keep the presents looking nice. I comfort myself that I haven't gotten that bad yet.

My mother loved both "the hunt" and "the anticipation" of gift giving. She rationalized what others might consider compulsive behavior in three ways: the money she saved, the quality of gifts she could give, and having her Christmas shopping done by January. As a recipient of her largess, who was I to argue with those rationalizations?

As much as she loved getting a bargain, giving thoughtful and well-considered gifts to her loved ones was even more important. Giving motivated her, whether it was at Christmas time or merely hosting company in her home. In an unusual way, my mother had a gift for focusing on others. And as I've gotten older, I am realizing what an important attribute and spiritual gift that can be.

No, it is not Christmas time yet. But when is giving and generosity ever out of season?
