From the Pastor . . .

“For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son . . .” So begins what is probably the best-known Bible passage in the nation, if not the world. John 3:16 is the passage memorized by Christians and non-Christians alike. At football games, baseball games and political rallies we see signs promoting the reading from John’s gospel. For many of us this passage may bring up positive or negative feelings, depending on how it has been used in our history.

This Sunday, we will look at this passage again in its full context as a part of the story of Nicodemus. Nicodemus came to Jesus under the cover of night and found Jesus inviting him into a new life, a life that took him away from his enslavement to the law and brought him into the light of God’s love. Too often, I think, we interpret this passage to be about what is *expected* of us and what we need to believe in order to receive salvation. We ask questions about what we need to *do* to be in God’s good graces (something we tend to do during Lent anyway). This passage, however, is much more about God’s love and the way God has called us into a relationship with God through Jesus. This passage is good news for the world and I invite you to join me on Sunday as we explore it together.

May your Lent be filled with peace and an assurance of God’s deep love for you in Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit.

MEETING YOUR PLEDGE: If you are a mature 70 1/2+ years old, remember that you may meet your 2017 financial pledge by donating directly to the church from your IRA. You will not be taxed on the portion of the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) that you donate. Any of the RMD that you take personally will be subject to tax. Also, the donated portion will not be eligible for itemizing for deductions in 2018. To make a donation directly from your IRA, contact the financial advisor/bank/credit union/broker holding your IRA for how to use this opportunity.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CHURCH: The Session has set **next Sunday, March 19** as the date for the Annual Meeting of the church. At this meeting, members will hear a report from the Finance Committee and approve the terms of call for the pastors. **The meeting will take place at the end of worship.**

DURHAM CAN at Work: This past Sunday Durham Congregations, Associations and Neighborhoods (CAN), of which First Presbyterian is a member, co-sponsored with the NC Congress of Latino Organizations a forum related to the safety and protection of immigrants and refugees in Durham. It was a remarkable and inspiring event attended by over 1,300 persons. The Durham Police Chief and the Office of the Durham County Sheriff committed to not work with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) in deportation efforts and to not set up checkpoints which includes not setting up checkpoints at churches and schools. The County Commissioners and the City Council committed to protect the welfare and safety of immigrants and refugees in our city and county and provide them with full county and city services and support. The Durham Public Schools Superintendent declared that the school system will not share citizenship status of students or their families with anyone and to protect that information from outside inquiry. The overwhelming support of our immigrant and refugees neighbors demonstrated that Durham is a city and a county of inclusion.
