From the Pastor ...

Dear friends,

As we move toward Holy Week, I hope that you have found ways to have a Holy Lent, whether it is through worship each week, one of our three Lenten classes, your own prayer and study, the adding in of a discipline, or the taking away of a vice. I hope that in some way you have found a way to create space in your life for reflection, meditation, prayer, joy, laughter, and hope.

This Lent, our congregation has dealt with deep sorrow and the season has been marked by loss and grief. The Saturday before Lent, we celebrated the life of *Bill Lorimer*. A Saturday in the middle of Lent, we celebrated the life of *Tom Carsey*. The final Saturday of Lent, we will celebrate the life of *Dorothy Graham*. In all of this, we have said goodbye too soon to those we have learned from, laughed with, served with, and loved.

C.S. Lewis reminds us that loving another is a risky business:

There is no safe investment. To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything, and your heart will certainly be wrung and possibly be broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact, you must give your heart to no one, not even to an animal. Wrap it carefully round with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements; lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket – safe, dark, motionless, airless, it will change. It will not be broken; it will become unbreakable, impenetrable, irredeemable. The alternative to tragedy, or at least the risk of tragedy, is damnation. The only place outside Heaven where you can be perfectly safe from all the dangers and perturbations of love is Hell.

We have loved, friends, and as a result, our hearts have been broken. But what is the alternative? Not to love? Of course not. We love because God is love and because we have experienced God's unending love for us. We love because we see God in one another and because we are seen as God's beloved by those who love us. God's love comes as a gift to us and we experience that love when we love another.

Jim McKinnon, the first pastor I worked with after I was ordained and a cherished mentor, died just over a week ago. When I heard the news, I crumbled to the floor in sorrow because I loved him. He was an incredible man and a gift from God to endless people he cared for, taught, counseled, guided . . . and loved. He lived the way of Jesus. When I served with him, we often visited church members in the hospital together and would each pray for the person we visited. When Jim prayed, he would ask God to be as near to the person as "hands and feet and the very marrow of their bones." In times of fear, sorrow, sickness, and grief, Jim knew that God was already that close to us and even closer. His words reminded us all of that comforting news.

To love another person is to see the face of God. What brings me immense comfort in these Lenten losses we have experienced together, is that we have seen God in these holy friends and that they now know God's face. God's extensive, intimate, powerful, everlasting love is as close to them as hands and feet and the very marrow of their bones . . . and now, even closer. What comfort! What joy!

There is a reason that Lent comes before Easter. We cannot deny the pain and suffering that led to the cross any more than we can deny the pain and suffering in our own lives. We also cannot deny the wondrous love for us all that guided Jesus to resurrection joy and life everlasting. May our love for one another and for God be directed by that love and may we claim the Easter resurrection joy and promises for ourselves and for those we have loved along the way.

"Remember, I am with you always." The message of Easter is that kind of love. Thanks be to God.

PARISH NOTES

- **LENTEN MATCH:** With Deepest Gratitude Thanks to the generosity of the congregation as we raised \$21,235 and exceeded our Lenten Match! There was broad support for this request as 80 households gave a "gift for Lent." The money raised, along with the money given by our donor, will be used to assist our neighbors in need for food, transportation, housing, and other critical needs. *The Service & Mission Committee*
- The Friday morning Bible Study is deviating from virtues for Lent (Feb. 16 March 30), to focus on vice in a course called: "What's Nice about Vice: A Positive Look at the Seven Deadly Sins". The curriculum for the course will consist of a series of TED Talks about topics such as sloth, gluttony, pride and lust, which we will discuss together in class, supplemented by biblical stories and passages that are pertinent. The topic for this week is "gluttony;" and next week we'll finish out with "greed." The class is open to everyone, on Fridays from 10:30 noon at the church. *Marilyn Hedgpeth* leads the class and would love to have you join us as a Lenten practice.
- The Lenten elective, *Holy Listening: Poetry Reading and Writing*, which used poetry as a lens for focusing our attention on God, has ended. But members of the class have requested that we continue, perhaps on a monthly basis, bringing poems to share, writing poems to share, looking at Biblical poetry, and considering how metaphor and image form us spiritually. Since most good poetry is essentially about love or death, and since we will be on the other side of Easter/Resurrection Day, the group would like to meet again on Sunday, April 15 from 5 6 p.m. in room 205, to discuss and share poems that deal with loss and/or death (their request). Anyone is welcome to bring some interesting poems to share, and to join us around the table. *Marilyn Hedgpeth* is the facilitator.
