You give to additional hunger ministries through the Hunger for Change offering each month (setting aside 2c per person/per meal each day) and support other local, national, and international causes and ministries through our four denominational offerings each year (One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peace and Global Witness, and Joy Gift). Your generosity extends into our Christmas Eve Offering, which we designate for one or more organizations each year.

In addition to monetary gifts, stewardship is all about giving generously of our time and talents. We are blessed with members who volunteer their time and talents in many ways in each of the organizations listed – as board members, food preparers, tutors, builders, and other kinds of volunteers – and they always need more!

We are grateful for the time, talent and resources you generously give to support this work. Our congregation is full of kind and generous people who want to make a difference in the world – and are doing so! Your pledge to our annual stewardship campaign allows us to continue to support the ministries above and to build on our support of other critical ministries as well. Thank you!

2. Regarding our move toward pay equity for two staff members, does this mean that all other staff members are already being paid equitably to their peers in similar church positions which similar experience and skills?

A. Yes, to the best of our knowledge. The Personnel Committee has reviewed the salaries of all employees and have found them to be equitable. The committee will continue to review salaries and benefits of staff members periodically to make sure they remain equitable.

If you have other questions, please know that I would be happy to talk with you. I am endlessly grateful for all of you who make up FPC and make this church such a clear reflection of God's calling to us in Jesus Christ. Thanks be to God for all God calls us to do and be! What joy to worship together and share the light of Christ in the world in our work, our service, and our care for others in our midst, in the city around us, and far beyond.

Day of Service and Hurricane Update

Thank you for the great response in providing cleanup buckets. Our high school Youth Group assembled the first 40 buckets, and 17 volunteers completed the effort on the Day of Service (October 6) , finishing with 82 buckets. Volunteers from The Presbytery of New Hope collected the buckets on October 8th , stopping at several other Triangle area churches before delivering 587 buckets to New Bern and Pollocksville. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is planning to open two or more Host Sites for volunteers to stay while working on Florence Recovery in the coming months.

Thank you also to the volunteers and team leaders for the Day of Service. Forty five people worked at five sites, sorting food, gleanng, painting, making buckets, and moving one of our members who had flood damage.

September 2018 (reprinted here in its entirety)

The Session met on Monday September 24 for its monthly Stated meeting. **Brent Curtis** led a devotion reflecting on stewardship and stories. The Session heard reports from **Mindy Douglas** and each of the associate pastors, and formally approved a previously passed motion for the use of the sanctuary by Church World Service for an interdenominational prayer vigil.

The Session also passed two motions:

1. **Approved an increase in the fees for leased parking spaces** in FPC's parking lot, effective January 1, 2019, to \$90 per month for single-space arrangements and \$80 per month for multi-space arrangements.


