From the Pastor . . . Dear friends,

For many, the month of November serves as an opportunity to embrace gratitude as a spiritual discipline of sorts. Some keep a gratitude journal for the month, writing down one thing in the morning for which they are grateful and another in the evening. Others start a gratitude jar and watch as it fills with the ways they are grateful. Still others post on Facebook something for which they are grateful each day. These disciplines serve as opportunities to recognize the many gifts in our lives. Too often we take these gifts for granted. When we stop to realize how many gifts we have been given, even on those days filled with trails and griefs, we can become overwhelmed with gratitude.

In the Christian faith, we understand gratitude to be a close companion of God's grace. Karl Barth writes, "Grace and gratitude belong together like heaven and earth. Grace evokes gratitude like the voice an echo. Gratitude follows grace like thunder lightening." While much in this world stirs up our fears, anxieties, self-doubts, and judgment, God's grace and love remind us that the earth is the Lord's and that in Christ we have fullness of life and hope for all eternity. God's light shines brightly and overcomes even the darkest corners of despair. When we open our eyes to God's movement in our midst, we know this, and our gratitude for God's grace overflows.

I pray that this Thanksgiving month you will be able to set aside your deepest concerns and worries, turn them over to God, and rejoice in the gifts of love that you have been given and invited to share with others. May love and light overflow in your life and may you find joy and gratitude in the most surprising of places.

Maya Angelou, that wise and wonderful poet, knew about gratitude in the midst of hardship. She knew about God's grace and she knew how to find joy and light even in the darkest of places. She writes:

FPC PARKING ALERT on evenings and weekends ...

FPC has had a long-standing agreement with the Marcus Hill Law Office next door to the church (311 E. Main) to park in that lot on weekends, especially Sunday mornings, in exchange for use of the church's trash dumpster. We have now been asked to leave the three spaces closest to the rear of the building open for his staff who may be called in to work on special projects to meet deadlines, especially on the weekend. So we ask that you not park behind the building in those three specific spaces. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

FPC Landscaping and Grounds Update

You'll notice the arrival of a new trash can, which is placed on the sidewalk between the foyer and the parking lot. This location was selected based on weekday foot traffic and the presence of trash in nearby bushes. We may add additional trash cans in the future.

This spring it was discovered that several of the rose bushes have Rose Rosette Disease (RRD) or Witch's Broom. Unfortunately if a rose has RRD, it must be removed. Due to the large number of diseased roses and the ability of the mites that cause the disease to easily spread, we are removing all the rose bushes on the church grounds. The Landscape and Gardening sub-committee will identify new plants to replace the roses. - *Chris Brown*, Property Committee chair

Hendrika works with re-purposed frames and mats and a variety of recycled and re-purposed papers: metallic envelope liners and printed envelopes; stationery sheets; book jackets, end papers, and decorative borders; candy, chocolate, and tea bag wrappers; and gift wrap and gift bags. She loves the combination of a geometrically structured pattern and

the creative challenge of coordinating paper colors and texture with a frame and mat. For this exhibit at First Presbyterian Church (on display in Watts-Hill Hall), Hendrika has created a number of new designs with liturgical and theological themes, including a Celtic Cross, an Anchor, ICTHUS, a Pearl of Great Price, a Shofar, a Pomegranate, The Holy Grail (Chalice), and a Violin.

The meetings begin with a short presentation about one aspect of grief and then we break into small groups for discussion.
