Session Briefs

In its second stated meeting of the year, on February 25, the Session heard reports from the pastors and committees about ongoing work and new projects. A request from the Service and Mission Committee was approved, for the establishment of a **task force to evaluate the use of the church apartment** by a justice-involved individual. The task force is composed of members of the Property and Service and Mission Committees, church staff, and one at-large member. *Alice Raney* and *Barbara Buckley*, delegates to the February 23rd Presbytery, reported on the meeting and their experiences there; and *Marilyn Hedgpeth* reported on a break-out session on immigration, which she led and at which *Julio Ramirez Eve* spoke. Following her report, the Session passed a motion to endorse a letter to the members of Iglesia Emanuel stating that First Presbyterian stands in solidarity with that congregation and offering our support, and Session members individually signed the letter. SUNDAY SCHOOL and other study opportunities

Children's Sunday School (grades 3-6)

We have been trying out a new rotation model of Sunday School, which allows our $3^{rd} - 6^{th}$ graders opportunities to experience the foundational stories of the Old Testament in many different ways through drama, art, games, LEGOS, music, cooking, gardening, etc. It has been great fun for the students and for the teaching teams! March is upon us and so is Lent. So, beginning **March 10**, we will begin to look at Lenten practices leading up to Easter. The class meets in **room 201** of the education building at 9:45. (Bring friends and join us!)

Adult "Faith & Community" -

This Sunday being the first Sunday of Lent, Faith and Community will focus our attention on Jesus through the lens of African American author, philosopher, theologian, mystic, and social justice leader, Howard Thurman, whose theology of radical nonviolence shaped, and still shapes, many civil rights leaders. This Sunday. March 10, the class will view a documentary on Thurman's life, which lasts an hour. So, we will begin at 9:45 sharp, in order to view it in its entirety. The following Sunday, March 17, Sam Miglarese will introduce Thurman's classic work: Jesus and the Disinherited. Says Vincent Harding in the forward to Thurman's book, this richly endowed, seminal work can be more accurately and helpfully described as a profound quest for a liberating spirituality, a way of exploring and experiencing those crucial life points where personal and societal transformation are creatively joined...Ultimately Thurman's goal was to offer this humanizing combination as the basis for an emancipator way of being, moving toward a fundamentally unchained life that is available to all the women and men everywhere who hunger and thirst for righteousness, especially those *who stand with their backs against the wall*. Copies of Thurman's book will be available for \$13 for those who wish to read along. An additional opportunity to read and discuss Thurman's book will be on Fridays, room 205, from noon -1 p.m., March 8 – April 12, facilitated by *Marilyn Hedgpeth*. If you are not familiar with Thurman, this is a great opportunity to become familiar with this founding father of the civil rights movement.

Adult Lectionary Class -

March 10: Lent is a time for self-examination, but before we can begin that process, we need to re-affirm that it is God whom we worship and serve. Jesus deflected the devil's temptations by putting the focus on God. "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved." Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the **East Parlor**.

March 17: As we begin our Lenten self-examination, what will we find? Will we find that we have doubted in God's promises? Will we find that we have based our lives on poor examples? Will we even find ourselves accused by the words of the Christ we are seeking?

Adult Journeys & Scratch - This weekend Journeys/Scratch will finish Isaiah. Although we won't start the Flannery O'Connor study until the following weekend, March 17. *Lea Bingham* suggests we begin with the following two stories by O'Conner: "Everything That Rises Must Converge" (*Link*) and "Revelation" (*Link*). All are welcome to join this class which meets at 9:45 in

room 205 of the education building.

Women's Spiritual Formation - *Susan Dunlap* leads this class for women in the **basement parlor** at 9:45. This class is a great support system of sharing and prayer for women.

The Thoughtful Christian (Parenting class) - a time of discussion and support for parents who find raising children in today's world to be an exciting and daunting task. We are using *The Thoughtful Christian* as our resource. The class meets in the **apartment classroom**, upstairs in the church house at 9:45. Parents of any age are welcome. Mindy Douglas leads this class.

Friday Book Study – The Friday Book Study welcomes all who want to journey through Lent using Howard Thurman's classic work, *Jesus and the Disinherited*. Copies of Thurman's book will be available for \$13. We will watch the documentary of Thurman's life this **Friday**, **March 8**, and then work our way through Thurman's book and study some of his other writings throughout Lent. The class meets from noon - 1 p.m. in room 205 of the education building, and all are welcome.



The days are surely coming (soon) when we will complete our Confirmation journey together! Coming up quickly is our meeting with the Session over dinner on **Tuesday**, **March 19** from 6-7:00 p.m., and Confirmation in worship on **Sunday**, **March 31** (with a reception following

worship). Between then and now, we will continue working on our "faith words", as a way of "speaking God"; we'll hear from some of FPC's high schoolers about their memories of Confirmation; we'll watch a few more of the hilarious but thoughtprovoking "Jerrod" videos; and we'll prepare for the time with the Session and for that Confirmation moment in worship. Our friends from Covenant (*Nathan* and *Theo*) will be with us in worship on March 31, but they will be confirmed at their own church. We'll let you know when that will be, so we can perhaps join them for that event. Contact *Marilyn Hedgpeth* if you have any questions.

Dear friends,

I wanted to let you know about the plans for this summer's upcoming Great Big Church Family Festival (GBCFF), because it will be slightly different and because I'm excited about it! You've got the dates and locations: **June 9** (FPC), **July 7** (Trinity Avenue), and **August 4** (Mt. Bethel). You've got the time: 5:30 – 7:30 p.m. And I'm giving you the cost: \$10 per person/per night or \$30 per family/per night (same as last year).

Now here is what will be different this year. **GBCFF this year will be geared towards service projects that we can do together as a family, young and old.** So, if your youth needs summer service hours, they can acquire those by helping prepare for the evening and participating in the event (perhaps 3 hours of service per event). We will eat dinner together, as is our custom, and we'll share a Bible story and sing some songs. But most of the time we will be working on an array of service projects, like: preparing hurricane kits; making and packing lunches for Urban Ministries and Open Table; making blessing bags; gathering supplies for our Armed Forces; packing backpacks with school supplies; etc. So the \$10/\$30 cost covers dinner, plus supplies for the projects. I know well that you will greet them warmly and weave them into the activities of the evening with great hospitality.
