On February 27, 111 joined

us for in-person worship and 56 households watched the live-streamed broadcast.

The *flowers* in the sanctuary are given to the glory of God and in loving memory of *Bill Lorimer* on the occasion of his birthday by his wife *Marcia Lorimer*, and his sons *Stephen and David Lorimer*.

Hearing Assistance Receivers are available for use during worship from the audio console located at the rear of the sanctuary. Before you leave the sanctuary, please turn off the receiver and place it in the specially marked receptacle or return to an usher.

The *Pulpit Paraments*: In 2012 First Presbyterian Church commissioned Laurie Wohl to design and create paraments to be hung from the pulpit and lectern during Lent and Advent. Wohl is an internationally known fiber artist who exhibited her work at the church in spring of 2012. Her liturgical projects emphasize the "threads that bind" and the unity of the Old and New Testaments. We are grateful that the bequest of Anne 'St. Clair' Williams made it possible to enhance our sanctuary with these beautiful works of art.

The *Lenten Banner* was completed in 1990 and dedicated in 1991. It depicts traditional Lenten symbols. The banner was made possible by funds donated in memory of *Bess Bryant* and by the stitching of many devoted members of this congregation.

Portions of *today's worship texts* were reprinted from *Feasting on the Word* (Year C, Volume 1) and *Book of Common Worship* (2018), and *Eucharistic Prayers*.

Many thanks to John Fricks, Jody Maxwell, and Keith Rokoske for their technical assistance with our live broadcasts of worship on Sunday mornings.

Restrooms are in the narthex (to the left and right as you exit the rear of the sanctuary), on the second floor of the education building, and on the first and second floors of the church house.

Masks are still required: The congregation will continue to be masked when inside as an act of generous hospitality to children who cannot yet be vaccinated and transplant recipients and others on medication that reduce the efficacy of vaccines.



March 15: Who am I Now? Identity and Roles


March 22: I'm Not Sure I Can Do This: Coping with the Pain of Loss

Heidi Gessner is an Ordained United Church of Christ Minister who served as the Palliative Care Chaplain and Bereavement Coordinator for UNC Hospitals in Chapel Hill for nearly 20 years. Heidi provided emotional and spiritual support to patients and their families, as well as the hospital staff. She's facilitated grief support groups for many years – both talking and writing groups.



Last winter McPherson Lecturer Macky Alston visited First Presbyterian's Faith and Community Class, promising to return for a full lectureship when it was safer to gather. He shared a preview of his current documentary film project, Acts of Reparations, a collaboration with Selina Lewis Davidson, in which they explore different ways communities are engaging in conversations and activism to heal the effects of slavery and racism.

On **Sunday, March 27**, he returns to FPC to continue this conversation. We hope you will join us when he leads the Faith and Community class, **9:45-10:45**, in an exploration of what it means as individuals to live into our values. At **11:00** he will lead worship service, asking what it means for the church to live into its values. In the

afternoon from **4:00-6:00**, Macky will be joined by Vanessa Hawkins (New Hope Presbytery Transitional Stated Clerk) and Alonzo Johnson (National Coordinator of the Self-Development of People for the Presbyterian Church USA), who will engage us and the congregation of Covenant Presbyterian in considering what it means to work towards a racially repaired world. All are welcome. There will be a breakfast with area clergy and seminarians on **Monday**, **March 28**, **9:00-10:30 a.m.** at FPC in Watts-Hill Hall. 


