


FPC Hosting Community Blood Drive Thursday, February 1, 2024 1:00-6:00 p.m. at FPC in Watts-Hill Hall

New Bible Study



Join Susan Dunlap as she leads this study on the Psalms on Sundays, February 4, 11, 18, 25, and March 3, from 9:45-10:45 a.m. in the Spiritual Formation room/basement parlor across from the Youth Rooms.

The Book of Psalms is the church's prayer book, and we learn from them that nothing need be excluded from our discourse with God. From lofty, poetic expressions

of praise to raw expressions of abandonment and anguish, to affirmations of the steadfast, bountiful love of God, the Psalms teach us how to lay it all out before God. We are buoyed by them, we connect to God with them, and we give voices to our deepest joys and longings through them. For many of us, the Psalms have been a source of sustenance and hope, and this study will allow us to share with one another our favorite Psalms as well as be introduced to new ones. We will examine the variety of Psalm types, from lament to praise, and explore ways to incorporate them into the prayerful life. As always, everyone is invited to this study, no reading required. While consistent attendance is preferable, it is not always possible, so all are welcome to just come when they can.





THE HUNGER FOR CHANGE OFFERING

First Presbyterian Church of Durham has a long history of involvement in hunger-related mission, most notably Pennies for Hunger (now Hunger for Change) and the Durham CROP Walk. In addition, we coordinate volunteers for the Community Kitchen at Urban Ministries of Durham, collect and bag food for the Iglesia food pantry, and the Food Bank of Central and Eastern NC. We also encourage giving to the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering on Easter Sunday which funds mission activities related to disaster assistance and hunger programs locally and around the world.

The funds received from our Hunger for Change Offering go to the New Hope Presbytery for the Presbyterian Hunger Relief Program and are divided as follows:

50% - International Hunger Relief Programs

40% - Local Hunger Programs

10% - Administration.

These funds are dispersed through local grants to hunger relief programs based on a grant application process. Urban Ministries of Durham, Presbyterian Urban Ministries and Iglesia Emanuel have been frequent recipients.

If your family committed to saving a **penny**/day each month, you'd be donating about \$0.30 per month or \$3.65 for the entire year. That's not much in the face of the rising need. Save a **nickel**/day, and you can contribute \$1.50 per month. A **dime**/day will generate \$3.00 and a **quarter**/a day will generate \$7.50 per month.

The fourth Sunday of each month is designated to receive the Hunger for Change Offering. Please consider supporting this hunger relief effort with a generous offering each month.
